Therefore, considering logic and critical thinking as core ingredients of the Greek-Roman cultural and artistic manifestations, thought and behaviours and, at the same time, as crucial elements for the correct understanding of the ancient cultures, that were deeply rooted in logical reasoning, the Department of Classics welcomes the initiative dedicated to Logic and its relevance from the ancient times to our days.
